A message from the Executive Director



An older woman calls our referral team every month. “Thank you, I am so grateful,” she says. Once a month she receives home delivered groceries from a local food pantry, a service coordinated by our team. She is unable to get to the pantry on her own, relies on a walker, and has no one to go on her behalf.

She is just one of the many individuals in our region who utilize our network of more than 65 food pantries each year. 2022 brought record breaking numbers, but not the kind to be celebrated. The impact of the end of COVID federal assistance programs such as child tax credits, on top of food inflation rates of 10-12%, led to a record total of 69,655 individuals visiting our food pantries, 34% more than 2021, with the largest increases in service to children and older adults.

“We have seen a significant increase in the need for food assistance—both in the number of new families asking for our service and in the number of times per month already registered families are asking for additional service” says Marcia Dudden of Living Hope UMC Food Pantry in Waterford.

Now, in 2023, 82% of our pantry members are experiencing higher service levels than in 2022. Pantry coordinators who have been working for decades say they have never seen it so bad and are struggling to keep food on the shelves. Our programs are critical to local food pantries. In 2022, our drivers delivered more than 3.6 million pounds of food directly to pantries, and we provided more than \$300,000 in supplemental food funding to pay for food from the Regional Food Bank, for wholesale produce, milk, eggs, and grocery store gift cards.

We build capacity through shared service models and collective impact. Service coordination and sharing information and resources helps our members do what they do best—getting food to people today and every day throughout the year. In fact, on any given day, 760 children are eating dinner because their guardians were able to get groceries from one of our member food pantries.

Working together to do more than any one of us alone. We thank you for the role that YOU play in the fight against hunger!

By providing a minimum of three days' worth of free, nutritious grocery items, food pantries fill a gap for many people on a monthly basis. Pantries strive to distribute food based on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's MyPlate model of the five food groups that are the building blocks for a healthy diet.

HISTORY

Our coalition was founded in 1979 by the Urban Ministries Fellowship, a committee of the Capital Area Council of Churches. We started with 10 member food pantries. In 1980 we sponsored our first food drive. That year, people sought food assistance 15,472 times from 16 food pantries. Since then we have grown substantially, as hunger has spread throughout the community we serve. Your support helps us provide food for 3.2 million meals annually to assist the hungry in the Capital District.

OUR MISSION

We are a coalition of more than 65 food pantries in Albany, Rensselaer, Saratoga, and Schenectady Counties, working together to feed the hungry. Our mission is to address hunger in the Capital District through our member food pantries.



Our member pantries were **visited 282,033** times by individuals and families enduring food insecurity. Our coalition saw a **27% increase** in overall pantry visits.

The Alliance
for a Hunger Free New York

The Alliance for a Hunger Free New York

In 2020, in response to the COVID shutdown, we collaboratively started the NYS Community Food Assistance Network (NYS CFAN) to work together to advocate for State support of food pantries and those experiencing food insecurity. In 2022, we formed a transitional board including NYS CFAN steering committee members and Hunger Action Network of NYS (HANNYS) board members to fuse those efforts into a new 501c3, The Alliance for a Hunger Free New York (The Alliance). The Alliance is managed by The Food Pantries for the Capital District and is working to increase resources for food pantries around the state while pushing advocacy agendas forward to end hunger across NYS through stronger living wages and federal assistance programs. We want to thank all the NYS CFAN, HANNYS members, and board members for their collaboration and partnership as we work together towards system change. The Alliance will present the 4th biennial NYS Food Summit Conference in June 2024.

New York State Food as Medicine (FAM) Project

In April 2022, NY released a proposal for an amendment to its Section 1115 Medicaid demonstration waiver addressing health disparities exacerbated by the pandemic. A key aspect of NY's proposal would allow Medicaid to pay for FAM interventions that respond to health-related social needs of beneficiaries, including food insecurity.

For the first time, the NYS FAM Project convened representatives from every region of the state and key stakeholders including healthcare providers and payers, government, academic institutions, advocacy orgs, community-based nutrition providers, retail, FAM program participants, agriculture and more to harness policy opportunities and develop recommendations as a "blueprint" for the sustainable and equitable integration of FAM services into NY Medicaid and the broader healthcare system. The 18-month project led by TFP and The Alliance, with funding from the NY Health Foundation and technical assistance from the Center for Health Law and Policy Innovation of Harvard Law School, published 15 policy recommendations to help guide NYS towards successful integration. Implementation of the Recommendations is being driven by the newly formed NYS FAM Coalition.

Healthy Pantry Initiative

In response to guest surveys indicating a desire for healthier food and the work pantries in our coalition have been doing to improve guest experiences, we began designing the Healthy Pantry Initiative (HPI). In 2022, we developed the HPI Assessment Tool to measure a pantry's status and provide strategies to meet the six objectives of a Healthy Pantry: Increasing Guest Choice; Promoting Additional Resources; Planning for Alternative Eating Patterns; Marketing Healthful Products; Emphasizing Fruits, Vegetables and Whole Grains; and Meeting Environmental Objectives. We have visited all participating coalition pantries to provide the HPI Assessment and have been encouraged by the results and enthusiasm among our pantries. We look forward to providing updates in our 2023 report! A special recognition and thanks to Kimberly Mitchell, a former intern and consultant, for all their work on this project.

Home Delivered Groceries: Addressing Barriers to Access

We have been working with coalition food pantries to provide home delivered groceries since the 2020 COVID shutdown. In 2022, with the end of COVID-related funding, we prioritized the creation of a sustainable home delivery program. Due to the results of our pantry guest survey, raising awareness of the immense need has been a primary strategy so that supporters and funders understand the importance of paid drivers and agency vans in insuring equitable services throughout our region. In 2022, 79% of referrals made by our Food Access Referral Team required home delivery. Our drivers made 2,487 home deliveries. Here is one example of someone who benefited from our home delivery service:

A previously homeless veteran reached out to our Referral Team. He said he had bad knees and was testing how far he could walk to get to a pantry. Our Referral Specialist told him that we could schedule a home delivery if he found it too difficult to get to the pantry. He let out a whoop of joy and said he was so grateful for our help and that he hadn't thought delivery was possible.

25% of food pantries in our coalition rely on their staff and volunteers to provide home deliveries. Our dedicated drivers fill the gaps. While financially and logistically challenging, we know how impactful this program is to our community, and we will continue to seek financial support to sustain and expand the lifeline that is our home delivery program.






